

The book of Genesis is the first book of the Old Testament, and of Moses. It deals with the story of creation, and with how God formed nature and animals as well as Adam and Eve. Of course, the stories of Abraham and his wife Sarah are also represented, how Lot's wife turned into a column of salt, how the 12 tribes of Israel arose, and how Joseph prophesied 7 fat and 7 lean years to the Pharaoh, saving Egypt from a famine.

About Willy Wiedmann



Willy Wiedmann was a multi-talent who achieved a great deal throughout his life as an artist.

He helped make Salvador Dali's work famous in Stuttgart, all while developing his personal painting style, running six galleries, and exhibiting his works of arts in museums internationally. Additionally, as a jazz musician, he played with some of the greats such as Louis Armstrong and Benny Goodman.

For Willy, Biblical stories had always been an essential element of his life, just as his works of art had been. He wanted to create something entirely new and unprecedented. Wiedmann had a vision to create the world's longest painted bible. Over the course of 16 years he brought his vision to reality through undaunting perseverance and his scientific expertise.

The result went beyond what Martin Luther dreamed of in terms of an illustrated Bible, and past what so many others have tried to achieve over the years.

Because he was not able to personally complete his mission of making "The Wiedmann Bible" accessible to everyone, his children have taken up the mantle of making their father's dream come true.
